GLRR Youths Make Strong Debut

Congratulations to the GLRR Youth cross country team and Coach Jesse Harris for an outstanding first season. In their debut race, the GLRR team had a fantastic day as the 13- and 14-year old boys dominated the New England TAC Junior Cross Country Championship race held at Bryant College in Smithfield, RI on Nov 13. The first four of 150 runners in the 4K race were GLRR team members.

The GLRR team finished first with a low score of 40 points and thus qualified for the Region I fi-

nals. Following the GLRR team were the Sentinel Striders of RI (88), NH Tracksters (123), and North Kingston of RI (248). All competitors for this race came from the New England TAC Association which includes NH, VT, MA, and RI.

At the Regions I Championships (includes New England plus ME and CT) on Nov 20th, the six member team finished second behind the Maine Harriers to qualify for the TAC Nationals. Members of the national qualifying team were:

Did you ever meet a celebrity, up close, face to face? Someone big. Someone whose name headlines the tabloids and whose face shines on TV?

I once saw Jimmy Carter in Clinton, but that was from a distance. Too many sunglassed, rifle-toting secret service men between then-President Carter and the roped off crowd. I just wanted to see if his teeth were real.

Instead, reporter Clark Booth (on the sidelines much more accessible) produced even greater interest. "Hey! You're Clark Booth!!" News nuts, compared with political peepers, have it much easier.

Golf fanatics have an even easier time meeting their idols. Buy a ticket to a pro tournament and see all the big names (providing that the money's there). But these fans still find themselves roped off... part of the nameless-faceless "gallery." What's more, golf pros have a way of looking right through the crowd. But runners, perhaps, have the best opportunity of all to meet the elite.

Top seeded runners flock to the big money races. Race directors hold pre-race clinics where, for a small fee, Mr. Average Runner can meet a celebrity. And then there's the race itself. There are all the top runners, shoulder-to-shoulder, front and center.

Some local races can attract world class athletes. Slattery's

Five-miler in Fitchburg, for example, has been host to Greg Meyer, Bill Rodgers, Geoff Smith, Mic O'Shea, Randy Thomas, and the lean, and then heavy, Patty Catalano. If you're bold enough, you can squirm to the front line and hear them chat. If you're even bolder, you can tap them on the shoulder and offer good luck. If you're bolder still, you can run like heck with them for the first couple hundred yards. Before her preeminence among American women runners. I once ran an entire race with this "pesty little skinny guy in a large baseball cap" who turned out to be Lynn Jennings.

Often, these celebrities make it even easier for the local runner - they mingle with the crowd. Its a common sight to see a big name runner having a post-race beer with hundreds of other happy finishers...

There was Greg Meyer... standing by his car, foot propped up on the bumper, tying his shoe. Boston Marathon winner. No one around. No special treatment. Just there. Alone. And me.

I approached him in this unique "one-on-one" situation to wish him well. I don't recall what I said,

but I remember that it wasn't very eloquent. (How did I get this coat of fur on my tongue all of a sudden?) Meyer, on the other hand, was very easy going and friendly. He asked me about my running! Posing with him for a picture (my wife happened to walk by with her camera), I felt part-tourist, partpeer. As we shook hands and parted, I told myself never to be intimidated by a famous runner again. They're just ordinary people!

Then I met Joan... Benoit... Olympic Gold medalist.

There she was, resting trailside at Sugarloaf Mountain, Maine. She had just completed the same run as me, weaving down the remote trail. She handled the bumps with ease.

I recognized her even though she wore mirrored sunglasses. It was my first visit to Sugarloaf and I heard that she skied there. But here? Now? With no one else around??

"Hi Joan," I said casually. (There was that coat of fur again.)

"Hello," she said. "Beautiful day, huh?"

She spoke back! To me! No one will ever believe this.

"How's the running going? I'm surprised your coach lets you ski!" Did I say that? I guess its true that you don't need a brain to speak. Of course her coach lets her ski! She's an excellent skier! And why bring up running? Its probably the last thing she wants to hear! Dummy!!

Then my brain said, "set world record... 2:22... won gold medal in '84... best in the world... here!... now!... alone!!"

Joan brought me out of a trance that seemed to last a week.

"What's your name?" she asked. "Do you run also?"

Me? You want to know who I am?? I told her and critiqued my upcoming races. I found myself name-dropping. "Bill Rodgers is supposed to run my company's roadrace."

Why did I do that? So what about Bill Rodgers! She asked me about me.

"Have you skied here before?" she asked.

I told here I was with a ski club from Massachusetts and this was my first trip to Sugarloaf. I then asked her where she was from.

Why did I do that?? Everybody knows she's from Freeport, Maine! More people associate Freeport with Joan Benoit than L.L. Bean.

"Freeport," she said, "a couple of hours from here."

Now it felt like I was talking with Joan Benoit for an hour, when in fact it was less than five minutes. We paused to watch another skier come down the trail and I mentally flogged myself for saying such stupid things in this once-in-a-lifetime encounter. Now, as the other skier approached, the opportunity was over.

"This is my husband, Scott Samuelson," Joan said. She introduced me as "Don."

I was greeted by a smiling face and friendly handshake.

"We've got to get going," Joan said. "Have a nice weekend. Nice meeting you!"

"Same," I said, "Bye."

I watched, mesmerized, as the two pom-pomed heads bounced down the slope. I stood there a while, thinking.

NEAC Pushes to Expand Organized Running Opportunities

While the interest in road running appears to have stabilized (at high levels to the surprise of the faddists and doomsayers), the interest in other types of running events is on the increase. Runners are looking to add other events to their menus - witness the growth of triathloning and biking among road runners. Recognizing this trend, the New England Athletics Congress (NEAC) is looking at alternatives to expand running opportunities.

Two alternatives are events that have been around longer than, say, Frank Shorter or Jim Concannon. These are track and cross country meets. Typically track and cross country events have been the domain of school harriers and national elites, save a few midsummer nightmares for masters and seniors and some between school activities for the young'ns. Whey are there not plenty of these types of opportunities for the middle-of-

the-pack runner? It's a conundrum: there are few because of low interest; there is low interest because there are so few. To break this circle, the NEAC is putting a lot of energy into expanding these opportunities, both by highlighting the current interest and by stirring more enthusiasm.

Although I am a master of the macadam, for your interest I am enclosing a list of track meets in this area during this winter. It is an impressive list and speaks well for the organizers. Even if you do not want to participate, some snowy Sunday will convince you to forsake that terrible long run and go inside and watch what happens on the ovals. Beware: you might get caught up in the spirit and sign up for one. Me too!

As for cross country, the ideas are less firm, but perhaps even more enticing. For example, there is talk of adding a cross country race to the NEAC Grand Prix series (just talk; nothing in cement; this is grass roots thinking; etc!). Another idea is to stage a contracted cross country Grand Prix series separate from the road races. Not that a swift run through the glades on a frosty morn is preferable to running in traffic down Route 110, but it could be fun nonetheless.

Although the NEAC is hard at work for your benefit, it has not yet heard the best ideas. These are still in your head. My job was to pass along this information to you. Getting your ideas to the NEAC is your job.

At the beginning of the 1988 NEAC Grand Prix, one of our closest competitors informed me that we were "the favorites." This dubious distinction was a result of what we did in the previous year's Grand Prix. In 1987, as you may recall, we led all other New England running clubs by

scoring a total of 79 Grand Prix points.

Reason for GLRR's Grand Prix Success

Just about any club can concentrate on one or two divisions and do well. A club's true strength, however, is measured in how it does in all divisions. It is here that the GLRR had no equal in 1988.

The GLRR led all NEAC clubs with a record total of 97 Grand Prix points. This was an 18-point improvement over 1987. Our closest competitor, with 82-points, was CMS. After CMS, the next closest team was CSU with 39-points.


For the second consecutive year, the GLRR led all clubs in total medals by winning 30 team medals. This included ten gold medals. The GLRR medalled in 30 of the 32 competitions we entered (this includes the two senior competitions that were held).

When it came to team participation, the GLRR again exhibited a strong showing. We averaged 44 finishers per race and we were the

only club, again for the second consecutive year, to field a team in every division of every Grand Prix race. To quote Don Allison, managing director of NEAC, "if there were a gold medal to be awarded for team spirit, Greater Lowell would win it!" Unfortunately exhibiting team spirit is not an official category, thus explaining our absence of competition. As illustrated in the chart below, our 1988 participation increase by 17% over 1987.

We had three of the four New England Grand Prix individual champions. Dave Dunham repeated as male champion, Lisa Senatore won the female championship, and Nancy Chapman won the female masters championship. Congratulations to all GLRRs who competed in the 1988 NEAC Grand Prix.
