

Airport Supervisor Sets Goal For 51 Marathons in USA Phil Orlandella

Being an Airport Supervisor at Logan International Airport is grueling and time consuming enough. leaving little, if any time to participate in any major outside events. especially a marathon. Working as an Airport Supervisor means many different shift changes. One month, the shift is 7 a.m. to 3 p.m., the next month its 3 p.m. to 11 p.m., and the following month is 11 p.m. to 7 a.m. there are times when working a double shift is necessary as well.

However, for Bob Grande, it's a piece of cake. He not only tackles his job, but he has managed to run in 21 marathons in the

United States, and is planning to participate in 30 more over the next year and a half to have reached his goal of running in a marathon in each state and in Washington D.C. as well.

Grande, a member of the Greater Lowell Road Runners, began his quest in the Marine Corps Marathon in Washington D.C. finishing in 4:37. "it wasn't fast, but it got me addicted," Grande said. Since then, Grande had pretty much closed

out the East Coast and has gone as far as Hawaii. "It wasn't originally a planned thing, I just started running and enjoyed the marathons and traveling to the different states," he said. He plans on running nine to eleven marathons a vear until he reaches his goal of 51, and he has already lined up West Virginia, Iowa, and South Dakota this summer.

Grande's best marathon performance came in Connecticut, where he ran a 3:25, but he averages about four hours. Not bad for a guy who a few years ago was diagnosed with cancer. After regular radiation treatments, the cancer appears to have been beaten, although he is still checked every six months. Grande never let his battle with cancer stand

in the way of running marathons.

thons.
Grande has not restricted himself to running in this country. He has also run marathons in Italy, Canada and Sweden. Plus, he has the distinguished honor of being the only Massachusetts member of the Indiana based group called "50 States and D.C."

Working at Logan and meeting his marathon goals has been no easy task for Grande, but his determination and desire will help him cross the finish line.

## Free Spirit Aiming to Run the Country

The well-documented slogan "Life is short, play hard" fits Sandown's Steve Grande and his attitude perfectly. The 39-yearold local has been running in marathons for seven vears, and his major athletic goal is believe it or not, to compete in a marathon in ever one of the 50 states in America.

"So far I've run in about 30 states. and by the end of the year, hopefully I'll be up around 35 or 36." Grande says. "I love the challenge when people say you can't do something. Running in marathons was definitely one of those things," he adds.

Grande has taken part in small marathons, as well as renowned races like the Boston and New York City marathons. He owns and runs Ammaculate Blind and Carpet Cleaning. And being his own boss has freed him up to roam to different parts of the country to race.

His interest in running marathons came at a point at which he felt he had to get involved in some physical activity. "I was 190 pounds and 32vears-old, and I knew I had to make some changes." Grande says. The first day he ran half a mile, increasing his distance to three-quarter of a mile the next day. By the end of the week he was running six miles a

he other night I was out on a training run when one of my running mates mentioned to me that he'd recently been doing some running down on the Cape in the vicinity of Craigville Beach. Instant flashback to that wide open stretch along the ocean which just happens to fall on one of my favorite running routes from the past ten vears or so. As fate would have it, as if drawn by some magnetic force, every time I return to Cape Cod somehow I always end up back out there on that course. Nine miles which could seduce even the most devout proponent of LSD to denounce his yows and put the pedal to the floor.

Once out the door. I cruised down Sea Street towards downtown Hyannis, a few blocks away. Loosening up and

collecting my thoughts. I anxiously wondered what was in the cards for me this time around. But it was always the same. You see, whether it was winter, summer, autumn, or spring there was something about this course, some

unknown element, which always drove me to run it at a totally crazy. spontaneous pace

virtually every time I ran it. There were no measured mile markers or splits, just a series of random, selfimposed surges ranging from a quarter of a mile to up to several miles in length, with the total elapsed time being the only gauge of my efforts.

At the corner by Dunkin Donuts I bolted across Main Street up through the dreaded rotary and over to safe asylum on the bike path where things would start to heat up. That bike path along Route 28 was a dream come true. From the very day when the steam was still rising from the freshly laid, hot blacktop it was to become the site of

numerous memorable runs in the vears to follow. As I hit the path I surged for several miles, absorbing the energy from those heavy metal machines alongside me on the road within spitting distance. The flatness engaged in one long, one sided

drag race.

At approximately three miles out I reached a set of lights where I took a left, exiting the main drag and abruptly entering a woodsy, countrylike setting. The cemetery, whose borders I trace as I rounded the corner. was symbolic of my oxygen starved state by this point in the run. For the next mile or so I worked my way over several rolling hills and through a beautiful area filled with large, Victorian homes which were in sharp contrast to the ranches and capes in most of the surrounding communities. Eventually, I passed the timeless, old

fashioned candy store and felt the pace quicken as I let gravity carry me down the hill and though the lights towards the oceans which loomed in the distance.

Running along the road which paralleled Craigville Beach in the summertime was always an eye opening experience. In this shadeless environment I was thankful for the cooling sea breeze which caressed my body and provided welcome relief from the hot sun which relentlessly beat down upon me. As I gazed upon the ocean and the mass of humanity which was deeply engrossed in paying homage to the sun's rays. I felt as if I had entered some other world or dimension. In sharp contrast to my efforts the only physical exertion most of these beings would consider on a day such as this would be a couple of trips to the hamburger stand. Taking it all

in I realized that this was the American dream....

Down the road apiece, I reached the bend in the road which sent me back up away from the shore line into a wooded, suburban area past a convenience store, a Mexican restaurant, and several motels. The frivolous stimulation which running along the beach front had provided was replaced by the stark realization that fatigue was setting in. These last few miles always served as a painful reminder that flirting with a suicidal pace can be fun early on, but may spell disaster in the long run, one of those deadly sins. But at least I had turned the corner towards home.

Eventually, I headed down a quiet side street. around a sharp corner and returned to the shore line by the Sea

day, and he was on his way to bigger and better challenges

Shortly thereafter, Grande's older brother Robert was scheduled to run in a marathon near Kennebunkport, Maine. "I told him I wanted to enter with him. He said I was crazy and I needed at least a year to train before entering such a race." the Sandown

man says

Of course, his personality thrives on challenges like that, and he not only ran the race. but he made it to the finish line nearly eight minutes before his sibling. Now that he's a seasoned marathoner. Grande has a rather unique training regimen. He takes training runs only when he "finds the time." and chooses instead to prepare himself for marathons by

running in smaller events like 5kilometer races.

And when it comes to races. Grande usually throws the rulebook right out the window. "You're not advised to do little things like wearing new shoes in a race, but I do," he says. Once he had a glass of wine and cold fried rice just before a race and finished with his second fastest time ever (three hours and nine minutes.) "I'd love it if they had

Chinese catering at the 20-mile marker," he jokes.

Grande expect to finish the rest of the American states he has vet to compete in over the next two years. "Once I've completed the United States I'd like to compete in the 13 provinces of Canada. I've already run in two up there," he says. He's also interested in running in Portugal with a friend who is a native of that country.

Grande, who is a member of the Greater Lowell Road Runners, uses running as his one and only social outlet. "It's a great excuse to travel and see the country. Besides, where else can you pay eight dollars and get all the food and drink vou want, plus Tshirts." jokes Grande.

but if the merchants want us they need to sell the concept of lightening up a bit. The majority of us are mature adults and as participants in multiple relay races fully know how to safely conduct ourselves during the course of the day. We understand when it's OK to pull over to the side of the road and when it's not.

The only real problem that ever occurs during the course of a relay is at the exchange points. With a little creative thinking, on all parts, this does not have to be a restraining factor. A perfect example of creative thinking was the closing of the Morgan Farm Road. This was best race improvement in the history of the relay - an example of an idea that more than worked. This kind of thinking and planning would go a long way in reversing the

recent negative participation trend.

Also on the downside, the rigid enforcement of only one official water station per 10 miles has the user friendliness of a death march. This is a disaster waiting to happen! If there is ever a hot humid day on this difficult course, there will be bodies and lawsuits all over the place. This rule borders on criminal negligence. Fred would have bagged the whole deal before he subjected his beloved runners to this rule.

I don't like continuing on such a negative track, but if the finish is so painful to the local police why not extend the course 100 yards and end the thing in the parking lot? This would remove everybody from the road.

As a long time relay junkie, I offer the above suggestions not as negative nit-picking and criticism, but as a hopelessly optimistic fan of this type

of event. I trust we can all find the light at the end of the tunnel that allows us to meet once a year and share the common bonding experience of all running together and against each other. I hope and trust we can find a way to turn the clock back and return to the innocent Fred Brown concept of runners coming together for a friendly competition and a collective rolling block party.

In closing, let me be the first to publicly affirm that I for one will be back next year. If for no other reason than to have a few moments with Fred and — with a little bit of luck — at least the initials FB will be on the sleeves of the

shirts.

### Fred Brown - a race to the future

This past weekend the Lakes Region played host to a growing annual attraction. Specifically, the Fred Brown Lake Winnipesaukee Relay Race. Supported by the communities around the lake. this event will grow and become a strong draw for tourism in the region between Labor Day and Columbus Day.

This year 210 teams competed along the scenic roadways around the lake. Each team had eight runners. Each team came with support people and family members. Based upon 1,680 runners having run the course, a total participation figure between 3,500 and 4,000 is well within reason. Those who came from out of the region stayed. ate and played in local establishments.

Next year could be even bigger, both in terms of numbers of participants and in range of exposure throughout the United States for New Hampshire and the Lakes Region.

Georgia and Utah.

The race offers prime sites at which local vendors and civic groups can promote the region and themselves. Other than Funspot in Meredith, which hosts the start/finish area, there are seven handoff sites in Gilford, Alton, Wolfeboro, Tuftonboro and Moultonborough. Each of these sites could become mini-fair grounds for refreshments, crafts, etc.

As a veteran of marathons, 24-hour relay races, 10-mile and 10-kilometer runs, I found the race to have been one of the best organized and controlled races I have seen. The coordination between race organizers and local officials was quite evident.

I visited the handoff points at the Alton Bandstand and Kingswood Regional High School, as well as stops in between. Police responded to incidents smoothly and efficiently.

Were there no negative comments from the public? No, and that is to be expected. After all, this was an event planned by humans, run by humans, and experienced by humans. Everyone is not going to be happy all the time.

However, race organizers have and will consider all the comments they receive. They make

# Runners Honor Memory of GLRR's Jack Keefe

DRACUT -Despite rain and cool temperatures. more than 200 runners came out on Sunday, October 3. for the 1st Annual Jack Keefe Memorial Road Race and Fitness Walk. As the winners crossed the finish line, the sun was peeking through the clouds. shining on what organizers and family members called a "great day."

The walkers were the first to step off from the Loon Hill Road starting line. some pushing baby carriages, others holding the hands of little children. Then it was time for the runners: some who came because they knew Jack and others just because they wanted to compete. For the latter, the course was a competitive one, rather more difficult than most in the Merrimack Valley area. Notable were the

many senior runners who had joined Keefe on the starting line of area races, including members of the New England Runners 65-Plus Club, of which Keefe was one of the first members

members. "Old Marsh Hill Road was Jack's own Heartbreak Hill." said one runner. Dracut fire fighter Leo Gaudette. He said the course was a good one, especially appropriate since it went past Keefe's home. While Gaudette noted that many of his fellow runners were there because they knew and respected Jack. Gaudette added that he talked to quite a few who came for the pure sport of it. Calling it a credible sporting event, Gaudette said he would definitely be back for the 2nd

Colleen Garry. aide to Representative John Cox. was co-chair of the event, which she said was a fitting tribute to a man who gave so much to his town. She was particularly moved by the opening ceremonies, with Keefe's three daughters -Marianne Keefe, Maureen Parent and Eileen Gizman - singing the National Anthem. "Also when they presented that quilt to Jack's wife, I got all choked up," Garry said.

Garry came up with the idea of a memorial road race as a way to pay tribute to Keefe; former postmaster of Dracut, band leader, philanthropist, and an avid runner. He died last December as the age of 67

Keefe never hesitated to offer his help in raising funds for local causes. As postmaster, he started the Dracut Santa Fund to provide toys for needy children. More recently. Keefe organized a road race to raise funds to reopen the Moses Greelev Parker Library that was closed in July, 1992. due to budget cuts. Keefe was also the driving force behind the Nawn-LeBrie Fun Day, a town wide outpouring of support for the three East Dracut burn victims and their families.

"Jack touched so many people in so many ways. I know he was up there smiling down on us." said Garry

aybe the Applefest Marathon should change its name to the Dave Dunham Half Marathon.

The Londonderry resident proved once again that he owns the 13.1-mile race through the roads of Hollis as he ran away from the field and won Applefest for the fourth consecutive

year. Dunham's finishing time of 1 hour, 8 minutes, 36 seconds fell shy of the course record of 1:06:07 which be set last year, and short of his state record of 1:05:43, which he set at North Conway's White Mountain Milers Half Marathon. But he still easily outdistanced his nearest rival, fellow Central Mass. Striders runner and Londonderry resident Bryne Decker, who was second overall with a time of

1:09:53.

"I would have liked to have brought down the record here, but this is a tough course," said the 29year old Dunham, who knew very early in the race that yesterday wouldn't be a record-setting day. "I planned on going hard for the first couple miles and if I didn't feel good I was just going to try to win it. I was sluggish and I knew at the first mile marker that it wasn't going to be a good day."

Mike Cook of Hyde Park, Mass. was third at 1:11:28, Vincent Connelly of Brookline, Mass, four in 1:11:58 and three more CMS runners — Kevin McGovern (1:12:08) of West Boylston, Mass., Stephen Jackson (1:14:08), of Worcester, Mass., and Peter Blomquest (1:14:27) of Worcester, Mass. — took

fifth through seventh place.

Nashua resident and Gate City Strider Laura Bianco ran ahead of a wide open women's field to win the female title in a time of 1:24:50. placing her 62nd overall). Michelle Horgan of Beverly, Mass., was the second female finisher, in 1:25:23, and Michelle Pelletier of New Boston was third in 1:25:36.

Medals were awarded to the top finishers in 21 age groups yesterday. The race was hosted by the Gate City Striders and sponsored by Brookdale Fruit Farm, Gemini Construction Company, Kerk Motion Pictures, and New England Country Pies.

## 5th Annual Bay State Marathon:

### Record Field, Record Times

he prevailing theme of the fifth running of the Bay State marathon in Lowell was that of a flat. fast course offering area marathoners the opportunity to qualify for the 1994 Boston Marathon This has always been the primary objective of Bay State, although those who remember the inaugural run in February of 1990 will recall that winter weather prevented some from reaching that goal. As it turned out, this year there were many other interesting stories among the 379 race finishers.

A calm, foggy morning gave hope to the runners that fast times would be in the offing. For the elite, \$250 men's and women's course record bonuses were on the line. Jim Garcia of the Central Mass Striders took command of the

race early on: the only suspense was whether or not he would claim the bonus money. Although he reached the finish line in 2:28:31 (17 seconds off the previous record), he was awarded the money. A slight detour sent him off the course for over a minute at mile 18. Michelle Bociek from Concord came

to Lowell simply looking for a fast time. She got that and the \$250 bonus, as her time of 3:02:46 eclipsed the old CR by nearly two minutes. In the accompanying half marathon, Dave Counts from Brook-

line and Ann-Marie Starret from North Andover led a field of 380. Their winning times were 1:10:33 and 1:24:11 respectively.

National class runner Dave Dunham kept his streak of having run all five Bay States alive, cruising the course in a workout time of 2:51:25. Dave Buddington, 52 of Glastonbury, CT has broken three hours in four of the five Bay States. including a 2:57:39 in '93. More importantly, this year's race was marathon number 99 of his career. Sharon Mordorski 41. of Buffalo Grove, IL. has completed a marathon in all fifty States. She is now on track to becoming the first person to repeat that achievement. She can check off Massachusetts on her list after her 4:11:39 here at Bay State.

Bob Sevene of the **Boston Athletic** Association, who coached Joan Samuelson to her 1984 Olympic gold medal, ran his first 26 miler in many years, finishing in 3:07:55. Pippa Davis, fresh from her recent Oregon to Massachusetts cross country run (for The Dana Farber Cancer Institute) used Bay State as a cool down, coasting to a finish of 3:43:27.

Once again, the two loop course around the Merrimack River lived up to its reputation as New England's fastest, with 167 of the 379 finishers meeting the standard for next year's Hopkinton to Boston trek. A first class effort by GLRR will surely let folks know that there is more than one quality marathon in Eastern Massachusetts.

In the half marathon first place male overall winner was Dave Counts of Brookline, MA, 1:10:33 and first place women's overall winner was Annmarie Starrett of North Andover, 1:24:11.


